FIRE CHIEF'S ANNUAL REPORT

The Winkler Fire Department (WFD) responded to 222 emergency calls in 2023, a 1% increase from the previous year. The City of Winkler had 160 emergency calls (4% increase from the previous year). The RM of Stanley had 59 emergency calls (4% decrease from the previous year). There were 3 Mutual Aid calls in 2022 (2 less than in 2022). There were slight increases in CO incidents, MVAs & False Alarms, whereas there were slight decreases in fire incidents, technical rescue incidents and EMS assistance calls.

The summary of emergency calls that Winkler Fire Department responded to in 2023 for all of our areas of response were as follows. The increase or decrease from 2022 are shown in brackets.

STAFFING

Winkler Fire Department has 42 total staff as of December 31st, 2023 Operational positions include:

- 1 Fire Chief (full-time)
- 2 Deputy Fire Chiefs (have dual roles including quarter time maintenance and quarter time fire inspector)
- 8 Fire Officers
- 25 Firefighters including 9 new recruits
- 4 Communications/Logistics
- 1 Fire Department Chaplain
- 1 Administrative Assistant (half-time)

Fire Hall Office Custodian (quarter-time)

The average turnout at emergency calls in 2023 was 14 firefighters and 2 Logistics & communication personnel.


RESPONSE TIMES


The average response time in 2023 to establish command at incidents from the time of 911 dispatch was 4 minutes and 04 seconds within the City of Winkler and 6 minutes and 26 seconds within the Rural Municipality of Stanley


NFPA 1720 sets a minimum response time standard for paid-on-call departments of 9 minutes for urban and 14 minutes for rural areas.










St Jean Elevator fire—Mutual Aid

- ⇒ There were no outstanding causes of residential fire incidents in 2023
- ⇒ There were no outstanding causes of commercial occupancy fires incidents in 2023
- ⇒ Many of the 2023 false alarms were again due to newly constructed buildings coming online with their fire detection & sprinkler systems.

Winkler Fire Department conducted fire inspections in 2023 as required by the Manitoba Fire Safety Inspection Regulation. The Manitoba Fire Safety Regulation defines those occupancies which are required to be inspected by local authorities. A quarter time fire inspector was hired to concentrate on catching with F1 occupancies at this time.

Public Education included fire safety presentations at the firehall, fire extinguisher training sessions, PSAs on social media and in local publications in partnership with other Mutual Aid fire departments, and of course with our annual Fire Prevention Week Open House in October.

TRAINING 2023

Fire departments have become expected to be all-hazard responders. It is challenging to keep skill sets current on all these response types.

The goal is to make realistic but safe training experiences so our responders will be well prepared!
